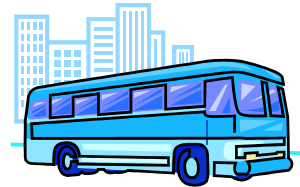
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### Buses (Mass Transit)

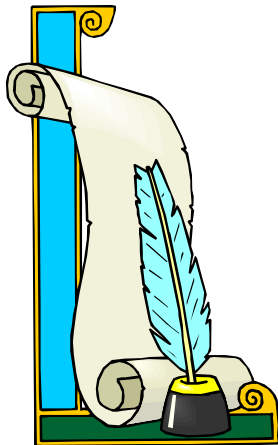

# Your Guide to Eugene

*compiled by Cathy Martz and Cheryl Landes*

Welcome to Eugene, Oregon's Emerald City! We hope you enjoy your stay here and that this guide will help you make the most of your visit to this beautiful city.

This guide focuses on attractions and restaurants in Eugene, where the PNW/ASI meeting and base hotel are located. Tourism information about Springfield and the outlying areas is also included.

The first cabin in what is now known as Eugene was erected in 1846 by Eugene Franklin Skinner. It served as a general trading post and was authorized as a post office in 1850. This was the first official recognition of the community.

Eugene City was platted and recorded in 1852 by Skinner and Judge David Risdon. However, the site had its disadvantages. After heavy winter rains, it became a quagmire and earned the nickname "Skinner's Mud Hole." A revised town plat was made on higher ground in 1853.

It's easy to get around here. Bicycling is a favorite transport, owing to a network of 28 miles of off-street paths, 78 miles of on-street bicycle lanes, and five bicycle-pedestrian bridges. And you can travel free on buses as a University of Oregon student—even take your bike with you. (Bicycle route maps are available on the City of Eugene's Web site.)

Favorite sports include mountain biking, river running, canoeing, in-line skating, and jogging on the extensive trails through and around Eugene. (In fact, Eugene is known as the running capital of the world, and Hayward Field is the site for more than a dozen U.S. and world records in track and field.)

Not only does the Hult Center for the Performing Arts attract worldwide attention for its annual summer Oregon Bach Festival, but it also features theater, dance, symphonies, choral works, and opera. And Eugene is home to rock, blues, jazz, and country; you can find dozens of performances taking place every week. On the first Friday of every month, Eugene's many art galleries host wine-and-cheese receptions for the public.



## Attractions

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### Art Galleries and Performing Arts (see also Museums)

- **Maude Kerns Art Center** (1910 East 15th Avenue)—This is the only non-profit visual arts community center in the Eugene-Springfield area. The center has a wide variety of permanent and temporary exhibits, as well as art classes, lectures, workshops, and small concerts. The Club Mud Ceramics Studio also provides studio space for working artists. Gallery hours are 10 a.m.-5:30 p.m. Monday-Friday and noon-4 p.m. Saturday. Suggested admission is \$3. For more information, call (541) 345-1571 or visit the center's Web site at <http://www.mkartcenter.org/>.
- **University of Oregon Museum of Art** (east of 14th Avenue and Kincaid Street, kitty-corner from the Knight Library)—This museum is closed for renovations and will reopen in the fall of 2004. More information about the museum can be found at <http://uoma.uoregon.edu/>.
- **Hult Center for the Performing Arts** (One Eugene Center, at 6th Avenue and Willamette Street)—September 24, 2002 marked the twentieth anniversary of this center that features top performing artists nationwide and around the world. It's also the home of the internationally renowned Oregon Bach Festival. Not only is the architecture of the Hult Center a work of art, but inside and outside you'll also find other works that were integrated into the building's design, such as clay and bronze tiles, sculptures, and paintings. Outside

on the 6th Avenue side of the Silva Concert Hall are more than 600 clay tiles that extend in a straight line into the lobby. For event information or to order tickets, call (541) 682-5000. More details are also on the center's Web site at <http://www.ci.eugene.or.us/Hult/default.htm>.

### **Museums (see also Art Galleries and Performing Arts)**

- **Museum of Natural History** (1680 East 15th Ave., UO campus near 15th and Agate Street)—This museum features a variety of exhibits focusing on the archaeology, geology, and plant and animal life of the Pacific Northwest. Hours are noon-5 p.m. Tuesday-Sunday, and the suggested admission is \$2. For more information, call (541) 346-3024 or visit <http://natural-history.uoregon.edu/Pages/home.html>.
- **Lane County Historical Museum**—This museum next to the Lane County Fairgrounds focuses on the history and development of Lane County. Hours are 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Wednesday-Friday and noon-4 p.m. Saturday. Admission is \$2. For more information, call the museum's 24-hour line at (541) 682-4239, or go to <http://www.lchmuseum.org/>.

### **Shopping**

- **5th Street Public Market**—The site of a restored warehouse, this market is now an assortment of more than 50 shops and eateries with items ranging from clothing to candles. Art displays and live musicians are other attractions you'll find in the market. Hours are 10 a.m.-6 p.m. daily for the shops; restaurant and café hours vary. For more information, call (541) 484-0383 or visit the market's Web site at <http://www.5thstreetmarket.com/>.
- **Eugene Saturday Market** (8th Avenue and Oak Street)—This weekly open-air crafts festival, the oldest in the U.S., features local art, clothing, crafts, and herbal products from more than 300 vendors (see <http://www.eugenesaturdaymarket.org/vendors.html> for a complete list). Also savor a wide variety of tastes at the International Food Court and live music performed all day on the Market Stage, ranging from folk music to blues. Across the street, you'll find the Eugene Farmers' Market, where you can buy locally grown produce, plants, and flowers. Hours for the Saturday Market are Saturdays only, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; call (541) 686-8885 for more information. The Farmers' Market is also open Saturdays, 9 a.m.- 4 p.m., and Tuesdays beginning in May, from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. For more information about the Farmer's Market, call (541) 431-4923.

### **Gardens**

- **Hendricks Park and Rhododendron Garden** (19th and Fairmount Blvd.)—Hendricks Park is a 77-acre forest that overlooks the Willamette River, University of Oregon and the city of Eugene. Hiking trails passing Douglas fir trees aged more than 200 years, ferns, and wildflowers wind throughout the park. The garden features more than 6,000 plants, the majority rhododendrons, azaleas, magnolias, and viburnums. The rhody and azalea blooms are at their peak in the spring, and the walk is relaxing and pleasant at any time of the year. - **Owen Rose Garden**—This nine-acre park overlooking the Willamette River near the Washington-Jefferson Street bridge has 4,500 rose bushes representing more than 400 varieties. There's also the century-old Tartarian Cherry tree (also called the Oregon Heritage Cherry Tree), which, according to local legend, was planted by the city's namesake, pioneer Eugene Skinner. ## Hiking and Biking

Eugene is one of the friendliest cities for bikers around, with its network of 28 miles of off-street paths, 78 miles of on-street bicycle lanes, and five bicycle-pedestrian bridges. You can also take your bike on the city buses operated by Lane Transit District (LTD); for more information, call (541) 687-5555.

- **Riverside Bike-Pedestrian Parkway**—The Riverside Bike-Pedestrian Parkway stretches along both banks of the Willamette in Eugene and Springfield. There are five bike-pedestrian bridges that cross the river, resulting in a wonderful loop system for bikers, walkers, joggers, and skaters. Spacious grassy areas abound, offering perfect opportunities to spread out a blanket to read, relax, or have a picnic.

Cheryl's favorite in-city place to bike is on the south side of the river from the University of Oregon to Valley River Center, which is part of this parkway. Along the way, the paved trail passes the Owen Rose Garden, which is mentioned earlier in this guide. In the early mornings and evenings, she has seen a variety of wildlife along the trail, including blue herons and other birds. She has also been the victim of traffic jams, courtesy of a pesky opossum who likes to hang out in the middle of the trail near the University of Oregon early in the morning.

- **Skinner's Butte Park**, honoring Eugene's noted early settler, is within easy walking distance from the Baker Downtown Center, or you can drive to the top for a panoramic view of the Eugene-Springfield area. If you decide to walk, be prepared; the three-quarter-mile trail to the top is very steep!

While you're in the neighborhood, you'll enjoy the Skinner Butte Historic District if you're interested in architecture and history. The nineteenth century era houses in this area are some of the earliest homes built in the city. The district's boundaries are from the Shelton McMurphey Johnson House at 3rd Avenue and Willamette to the Willamette River to 2nd Avenue along the Ferry Street Bridge.

Speaking of the Shelton McMurphey Johnson House, this is worth a stop. This beautiful Queen Anne mansion at 303 Willamette Street was built in 1888 and occupied by three families. Now the city owns the property and a non-profit organization handles the administration of the house and offers tours. The home is open to the public from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. Tuesday-Friday and 1-4 p.m. weekends. Admission is \$3. For more information, call (541) 484-0808 or visit <http://www.smjhouse.org/home.shtml>.

- **Spencer Butte**—This is one of Cheryl's favorite places to hike in the Eugene area. It's another steep walk, but definitely worth it for hiking buffs. From the 2,054-foot peak, you'll enjoy 360-degree views of the Willamette Valley and, on a clear day, the Three Sisters. There are several trails in the area, but the one Cheryl recommends is the Ridgeline Trail, a five-mile walk through a Douglas fir forest. You might also catch some glimpses of wildlife, depending on the time of day you go. One parking lot for the trails is located four miles south of downtown, near 52nd and Willamette Street. There is another parking lot with access to the trail to the east of the Butte, off Fox Hollow Road.

## Other Attractions Near Eugene

- **Oregon Air and Space Museum** (90377 Boeing Drive)—Located just south of the Eugene Airport, this museum focuses on the history of aviation. Hours are noon-4 p.m. Monday-Saturday, and admission is \$5. For more information, call (541) 461-1101 or visit the museum's Web site at <http://www.oasm.org/>.
- **Mt. Pisgah Arboretum Trails and Nature Center** (33735 Seavey Loop Road)—Located five miles southeast of Eugene in the 2,300-acre Howard Buford Recreation Area, the arboretum is another favorite of hikers. The arboretum has more than seven miles of trails, a wildflower garden, and a visitor's center with interpretive displays. For more information,

- **Dorris Ranch Living History Filbert Farm** (South 2nd and Doris Streets, Springfield)—This farm was established in 1892 and is the state's oldest working filbert (hazelnut) farm. Free self-guided tours are welcome from 6 a.m.-dusk daily; brochures are available at the farm or on its Web site at [http://www.willamalane.org/a\\_parks/park-dorris.htm](http://www.willamalane.org/a_parks/park-dorris.htm).
